Prevention of trafficking in persons and smuggling of migrants, and protection of potential victims of trafficking – screening, provision of assistance and referral to the available services.

5 Project Background

Migration remains a key feature of Thai society and plays a critical role in the socio-economic growth and development of the country. Representing approximately seven per cent of Thailand's total population, the number of international migrants residing and working in Thailand is estimated 2.3 million registered while 2.1 million unregistered. As a migration hub, Thailand is prone to the trafficking in persons and smuggling of migrants. The Government reports on trafficking indicates that in 2023, 503 individuals were identified by Thai Government as victims of trafficking. In the 2023 Government report on TIP, Thai Government also emphasized the increased number of trafficking for online scams and online trafficking. This report is aligned with the IOM data which demonstrates an increase of trafficking for forced criminality identified in Thailand.

Responding to this increase trafficking cases, IOM has conducted situational analysis to better understand the gaps and opportunities to enhance collaborative efforts in combating trafficking. One of the issues identified is the lack of awareness on safe migration, available protection services and referral pathways in Thailand. The low awareness on safe migration and proliferation of online scams luring victims with offers of lucrative jobs and easy recruitment processes, coupled with risk-tolerant behaviour from the young and inexperienced (one of traffickers' target profiles), has been pointed out as a contributing factor to the continued increase in trafficking caused abuse of technology.

To contributes to government efforts to enhances the public awareness on safe migration, available protection services and referral pathways for vulnerable migrants especially victims of trafficking in Thailand, IOM is seeking implementing partners to undertake community outreach activities in targeted provinces namely Bangkok, Chonburi, Songkhla and Tak that host large migrant populations.

6 Expected Results

In response to the emerging trend of trafficking and the gaps in providing protection for victims of trafficking identified in Thailand, the project aims to increased resilience of community against recruitment by organized crime groups and to enhance access to information on available protection mechanism and referral pathways for victims of trafficking in Thailand. Additionally, the project also aims to strengthen CSO's capacity to better assist victims of trafficking or those at risk of being trafficked and to facilitate access to regular pathways for vulnerable migrants who identified as victims of trafficking or at risk of being trafficked.

IOM is looking for a partner to enhance public awareness on TIP and to assist potential victims and victims of trafficking. IOM recognizes that protection and assistance are inextricably linked. The proposed interventions outlined below will strive to achieve full respect for the rights of the individual, through non-discriminatory and do-no harm approaches.

Terms of Reference

Introduction

IOM data demonstrates an increase in TIP trends, particularly in the areas of financial cybercrime in Special Economic Zones (SEZs) located in the border areas between Thailand, Myanmar, Lao People's Democratic Republic and Cambodia and online sexual exploitation in Thailand. The economic downturn has shrunk employment opportunities for young graduates in the region, who are now lured away by online offers of lucrative jobs. Since 2021, IOM identified and assisted more than 500 vulnerable migrants including victims of trafficking (VOTs) for labour exploitation, forced labour and sexual exploitation.

Responding to this increase trafficking cases, IOM has conducted situational analysis to better understand the gaps and opportunities to enhance collaborative efforts in combating trafficking. One of the issues identified is the lack of awareness on safe migration, available protection services and referral pathways in Thailand especially for vulnerable migrants who in needs. The low awareness on safe migration and proliferation of online scams luring victims with offers of lucrative jobs and easy recruitment processes, coupled with risk-tolerant behaviour from the young and inexperienced (one of traffickers' target profiles), has been pointed out as a contributing factor to the continued increase in trafficking caused abuse of technology.

To contributes to government efforts to enhances the public awareness on safe migration, available protection services and referral pathways for vulnerable migrants especially victims of trafficking in Thailand, IOM is seeking implementing partners to undertake community outreach activities in targeted provinces namely Bangkok, Chonburi, Songkhla and Tak that host large migrant populations.

Background

As part of the International Organization for Migration (IOM) project on Enhancing the Capacity of Thailand to Combat Trafficking in Persons and Smuggling of Migrants through Enhanced Border Management (2024-2026), implemented by IOM Thailand and funded by the Global Affairs of Canada, IOM is seeking to partner with a civil society organizations to enhance public awareness and capacity to prevent trafficking in persons and contributes to enhance protection services for victims of trafficking including through referral mechanism in Thailand.

This term of reference has been drawn up according to the objective of the program to increased resilience of community against recruitment by organized crime groups and to enhance access to information on available protection mechanism and referral pathways for victims of trafficking in Thailand.

Objective

The objective of the program to increased resilience of community against recruitment by organized crime groups and to enhance access to information on available protection mechanism and referral pathways for victims of trafficking in Thailand. To achieve this objective, IOM seeks partnership with civil society organization working with vulnerable migrants and victims of trafficking to achieve the following outputs:

1. To strengthen the CSO's capacity to better assist victims of trafficking or those at risk of being trafficked
2. To enhance public awareness on the new trend of trafficking and existing protection services for victims of trafficking in Thailand

3. To facilitate access to regular pathways for vulnerable migrants who identified as victims of trafficking or at risk of being trafficked

Proposed interventions

1. Strengthen CSO's capacity to better assist victims of trafficking or those at risk of being trafficked. Under this specific Output, the selected CSO will be working closely with IOM to design and deliver an internal capacity building program to enhance their capacity in assisting victims of trafficking or those at risk of being trafficked. This will include participating in a two-day workshop to design project goals, deliverable, indicative workplan, reporting procedures and monitoring and evaluation of project activities.
2. To enhance public awareness on the new trend of trafficking and existing protection services for victims of trafficking in Thailand. To achieve this specific output, the selected CSO will be responsible to develop IEC materials on TIP in particular trafficking for forced criminality and referral mechanism in the languages that migrants understand, develop campaign strategy and roll out the information session in targeted locations in coordination with IOM.
3. To facilitate access to regular pathways for vulnerable migrants who identified as victims of trafficking or at risk of being trafficked. Under this objective, the CSOs will work closely with IOM and Royal Thai Government to provide assistance to the victims of trafficking or those at risk of being trafficked to access protection services through National Referral Mechanism.

Overarching Outcomes:

The overarching outcome of this project is increased resilience against recruitment by organized crime groups by women and men and people with diverse sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression and sex characteristics (SOGIESC) from target online and local communities. The Ultimate Outcome of this project is reduced threats from human trafficking and migrant smuggling syndicates, including those linked to cyber scam compounds, to affected populations, including men and women in Southeast Asia.

Expected results

People at risk of being trafficked are equipped with information on trafficking indicators, reporting mechanism and available services in Thailand. Specifically, this project aims to achieved tangible results as follows:

- A project document submitted to IOM detailing project activities, target, deliverable, campaign layout, workplan and budget based on inception workshop.
- Draft campaign strategy and IEC materials developed using communication for development method submitted to IOM
- Quarterly report capturing progress updates of the project along with the financial report submitted to IOM
- Two good practices and success stories on prevention of trafficking and protection of victims of trafficking or those at risk of being trafficked submitted to IOM.

Impact

Victims of trafficking and or those at risk of being trafficked improved their awareness and resilience against deceptive recruitment and trafficking.

Partnerships and collaboration

Implementing partner will work with other relevant stakeholders anti-human trafficking committee at provincial levels to ensure effective delivery of project objectives and will ensure close coordination with

Protection Unit and Communication Unit of IOM Thailand which will support the accomplishment of activities and outlined deliverables and provide technical support and guidance to implementation team if needed together with monitoring activities and targets.
