IOM THAILAND 2020 YEAR IN REVIEW





In 2020, IOM Thailand's activities reached over 220,000 beneficiaries across 36 projects funded by 17 donors.

COVID-19 RESPONSE



13,952 migrants received food, water, hygiene supplies during the pandemic.

9 surveys and assesments were conducted to gauge the needs, conditions and challenges faced by migrants during the pandemic.

36,183 Information, Education and Communication materials (IECs) were distributed to migrants.

85,000 masks, hand sanitizers and infared thermometers were provided to Thai Immigration Bureau border officers and immigration detention centres.

4,999 employers from private setors were sensitized about increased vulnerabilities of migrant workers due to the pandemic.

MIGRANT ASSISTANCE AND HUMANITARIAN SUPPORT



164,710 migrants were reached through awareness-raising activities on topics such as migration policy, safe migration, trafficking in persons, labour rights and social welfare.

6,321 migrants benefited from direct assistance, including return and reintegration assistance, purchase of health insurance and first-aid.

37,830 food and non-food items were distributed to migrants in detention and at shelters as humanitarian assistance.

522 children born to non-Thai mothers at Ranong Hospital were issued with birth certificates by the municipality with the assistance of IOM's Legal Clinic.

CAPACITY-BUILDING



1,016 officials and civil servants from the Royal Thai Government received training on immigration and border management, trafficking in persons and child protection.

87 NGO and CSO workers were trained on leadership, data protection, communications for development, case documentation, monitoring and evaluation and advocacy.

899 migrants benefitted from vocational training, skills upgrade, leadership training and livelihood.

223 employers from the private sector were trained on ethical recruitment, employment and skills development for migrant workers.

PUBLICATIONS



43 publications were finalized and publised in 2020. Of this number, 39 were COVID-19 related publications.

WEBSITE



1,592 users visited the MitrThai.com information hub for migrant workers in Myanmar, Khmer, Laos and Thai languages.

PUBLIC AND MEDIA ENGAGEMENT



57 news reports, op-eds and feature stories referencing IOM Thailand's work were published by local and international media.

423 attended workshops, conferences and meetings organized by IOM Thailand.

REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT AND MOVEMENT MANAGEMENT



1,190 camp-based and urban refugees were resettled to 5 countries. Of this number, 545 benefitted from cultural orientation conducted by Australian Cultural Orientation (AUSCO) and Canadian Orientation Abroad (COA).

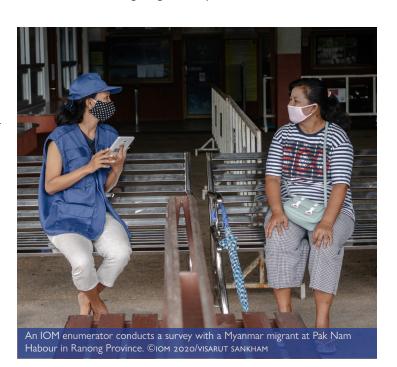
MIGRATION HEALTH



6,424 benefitted from health assessments conducted by IOM's medical teams.

24,809 migrants and Thai nationals in Tak and Mae Hong Son provinces were educated on malaria elimination and prevention by 339 volunteers trained by IOM.

15,541 long lasting insecticide trated bed nets were distributed to refugees, migrants and non-Thai nationals in Tak and Mae Hong Son provinces.
