HEALTH ASSESSMENT FOR AUSTRALIAN VISA APPLICANTS

Health assessments of Australian visa applicants are conducted by the International Organization for Migration (IOM) at the Migration Health Assessment Center.

What to bring to the health assessment

1. Valid passport. Photocopies will not be accepted.
2. Original ID.
3. Referral letter with HAP ID, HRI or TRN number.
4. Previous Chest X- rays, if available.
5. If you suffer or have suffered from any chronic condition or undergone major medical or surgical treatment, please bring medical records or hospital reports. Insufficient information may lead to delays and additional testing.
6. If you use glasses or contact lens, bring them to health assessment to avoid referral to the ophthalmologist.
7. For children of 2-10 years of age: medical record with results of the Tuberculin Skin Test (TST) or Interferon Gamma Release Assay (IGRA), if available.
8. If you have spent 28 days or longer in one of [Global Polio Eradication Initiative website](#) for lists of 'Endemic' and 'Outbreak' countries (including a combination of these countries) since May 2014. As of 14 Jul 2020, the listed countries are *Afghanistan, Pakistan, Angola, Benin, Burkina Faso, Cameroon, Central African Republic, Chad, Côte d'Ivoire, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Ethiopia, Ghana, Togo, Zambia, Somalia, Myanmar, China, Malaysia and Philippines*. **You will need to provide evidence of polio vaccination if applying for their visa outside of Australia. The vaccination certificate must provide evidence of polio vaccination administered within the last 12 months.**



Important Notice

Children under 18 years must be accompanied by a parent or a legal guardian with the power of attorney from a parent, who can sign and make decisions on their behalf.

Tuberculosis(TB) screening for children 2-10 years

1. Children aged two years or older and under 11 years are required to complete a Tuberculosis (TB) Screening test, either a TST or an Interferon Gamma Release Assay (IGRA).
2. If previous TST or IGRA, recorded in a valid medical record, is positive, TST or IGRA will not be done.
3. IGRA requires 1 visit and TST requires 2 visits with the interval of 48-72 hours. If the child failed to come for a second visit 48-72 hours after TST was placed, the procedure needs to be repeated.
4. TST can be scheduled on Monday - Friday, except Thursday (please see below the timetable for TST)
5. If TB screening test (TST or IGRA), either in a medical record or done at IOM, is positive, Chest X-ray is further required and additional charge will be applied.

Payment Information

Service fees are to be paid at the IOM office by cash in Thai baht.

Standard fees include:

1. Group-specific mandatory tests
2. Developmental assessment for children
3. Mini-Mental Examination, Global Assessment of Functioning and Activities of Daily living for senior applicants or applicants with disabilities
4. Pre- and post-test counseling
5. Pregnancy test, if indicated
6. Electronic photograph
7. Processing in eMedical



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Standard fees do not include:

1. Sputum Test for Tuberculosis (TB)
2. TB treatment
3. Any other treatments
4. Additional tests
5. Specialist referrals and investigations, which may be required to establish or clarify a diagnosis or prognosis
6. Vaccinations or translation of the vaccination records
7. Any costs associated with the applicant's travel to or stay in Bangkok

Advice regarding health assessment

1. For your medical examination, you will be asked to take off all of your clothes except your underwear. You will be provided a gown to wear.
2. You may request a chaperon to be present during your physical examination, especially if you are to be examined by a physician of the opposite sex.
3. Do not conceal medical conditions. Deliberate attempts to hide them will be reported to the Canadian Department of Immigration and Border Protection. The absolute majority of medical conditions are admissible, though some may require additional tests.
4. Do not conceal pregnancy. Pregnancy will not affect your immigration prospects.
5. Abstain from drinking alcohol on the day before the examination.
6. Women are advised to avoid health assessment during menstruation as it may affect results of the urine test.
7. Postpone or re-schedule your appointment if you or your children are ill with fever or rash.

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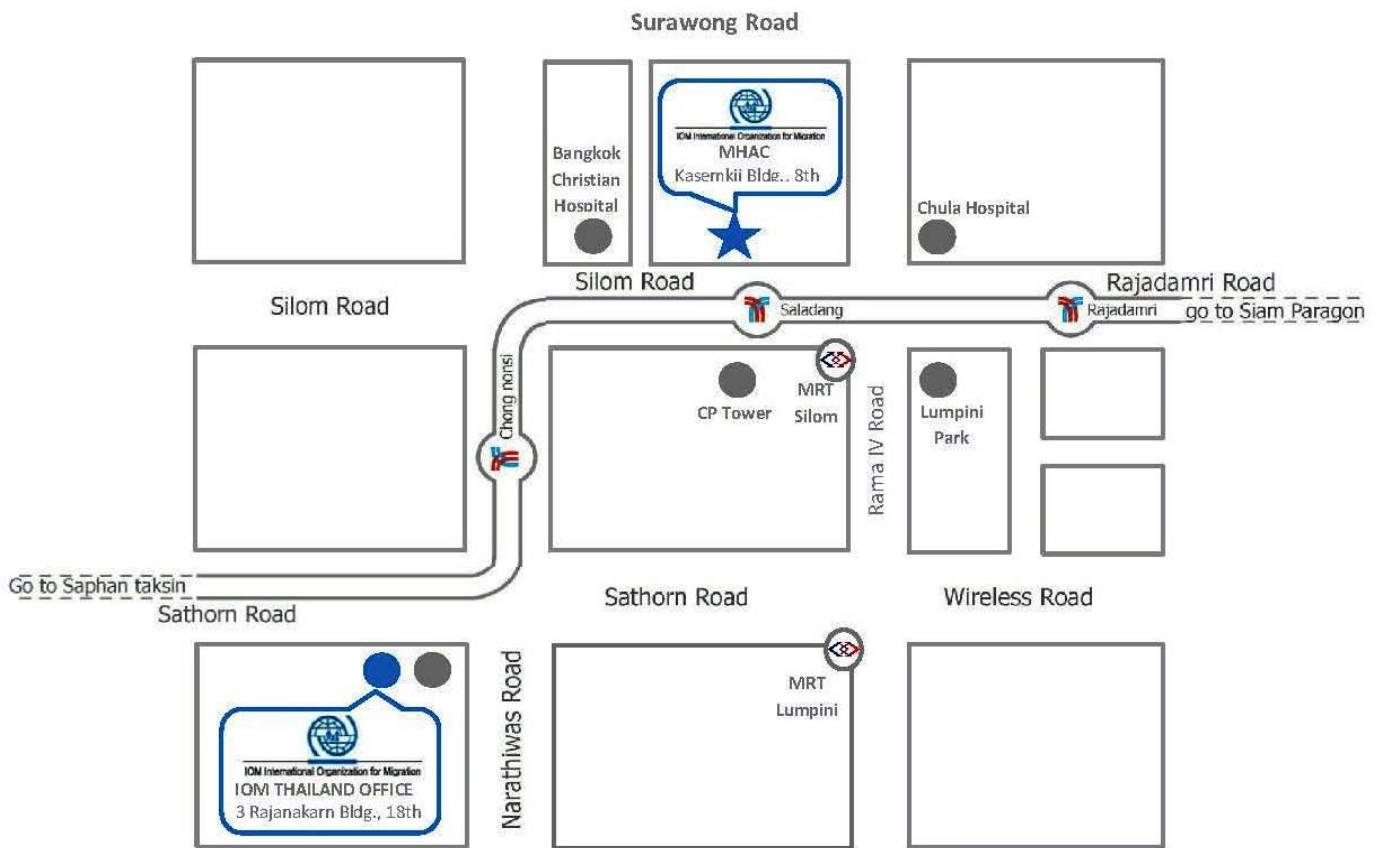


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
